

Karen Hicks is an international expert in grassroots political strategy, organizing, training and voter targeting and has held leadership positions in two presidential campaigns. In 2008, she served as a Senior Advisor to Senator Hillary Clinton. During the 2004 election cycle, she served as the Field Director for the Democratic National Committee. Previously, she served as Governor Jeanne Shaheen's Director for Policy at the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Service and as Executive Director of New Hampshire Citizen Action.

Diane M. MacDonald is the chief financial officer for the Broad Institute, a research collaboration of Harvard and MIT. She is known for implementing successful management improvement efforts in both the public and non-profit sectors and developing performance-based budgeting and management systems for state and local. She previously was the director of finance and operations for Community Catalyst, and has also worked within the Office of Budget Management for the City of Boston, including four years as budget director.

Kavita Patel is a fellow in the Economic Studies program and managing director for clinical transformation and delivery at the Engelberg Center for Health Care Reform within the Brookings Institution. Previously, Dr. Patel directed the health policy program at the New America Foundation, and served in the Obama administration as director of policy for the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs and Public Engagement in the White House.

Robert Phillips is the Director of Health Programs at the Sierra Health Foundation and Board Chair of Social Interest Solutions. Prior to this, Robert served as Program Director, a Senior Program Officer and Senior Fellow at The California Endowment, where he led the foundation's efforts around health care reform, health advocacy, and improving health outcomes for California's children of color. His research includes assessments of federal programs for children and the elderly, the growth of for-profit enterprises in health and mental health care, and public attitudes toward health care reform. Anthony So, M.D. is director of the Program on Global Health and Technology Access at Duke University's Sanford Institute of Public Policy. He was associate director of the Rockefeller Foundation's Health Equity program, where he promoted access to medicines policy development in developing countries, co-founded a program exploring the role of intellectual property rights in innovation and access, and launched the "Trading Tobacco for Health" initiative. He previously directed the Liaison Office for Quality from 1997 to 1998 at the Agency for Health Care Policy and Research, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Katherine S. Villers founded and is the president of Community Catalyst. As both a non-profit organizational leader and an activist in philanthropy, she has spent the better part of three decades elevating consumer and community voices in the fight for all people in the U.S. to obtain quality, affordable health care. She established Community Catalyst in 1998 and previously co-founded the Villers Foundation in 1982 and Families USA in 1989, where she also served as executive director for their Massachusetts programs. She previously founded and was executive director of New Communities Housing Management, a pioneer in integrating resident capacity-building approaches into the management of low- and moderate-income housing communities.

Wendy Warring is senior vice president of Network Development at Children's Hospital in Boston and is the chair of Community Catalyst's Board of Directors. She previously was senior vice president and chief operating officer of Connecticut Children's Medical Center and also worked as executive vice president of UMass Memorial Health Care. She was commissioner of the Division of Medical Assistance for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and served in various legal roles as general counsel for the Massachusetts Housing Finance Agency and deputy legal counsel for the Governor of Massachusetts.
